## FROM THE PASTOR

---

I find myself writing these words in that mysterious space between this world and the next, while my mom, in her last days under Hospice care, rests comfortably near me. I know this will not last for long, and while I am grateful for this short window of time, it is hard to find words to describe this moment.

When I arrived at New Providence in June 1999, I could never have imagined that a significant piece of the next chapter of my life would include being primary caregiver for my previously healthy, energetic, and determined mother. After a massive stroke in December 2002, she and I rewrote that script, which we could never have done without your help and blessing.

No surprise, my mother quickly reclaimed "healthy, energetic and determined," despite it all. She has managed (once again) to do what I have known her to do all my life: she has refused to surrender to adversity, she has been resolutely welcoming, especially of those who might pass by unnoticed, and she has seen far beyond the limited range of her own needs to reach out to others who might benefit from her love. She has continued to extend love and care, but has learned the even harder task of receiving love and care.

I think she's pretty remarkable. So you can understand why it's hard to say goodbye.

I've been reading a lot in the last few weeks about "anticipatory grief." Anticipatory grief is the name given to the feelings and reactions that occur when people are expecting a loss. But the fact of the matter is, I don't know what to expect. I have never known a world without my mom in it.

For all the days I've been alive on this planet, my mom has been the one who sat by the hospital bed of a dehydrated 5-year-old, and patched skinned knees and pulled loose teeth. She's the one who told the only girl on the street that she could hold

her own in the neighborhood water-balloon and dirt-clod wars, and who reminded the sobbing young adult that women in ministry could do more than bake brownies and be supportive. And for the last 14 years, hers has been the face that lit up the room when I walked through the door at the end of the day.

To be fair, I know that I am

far from the last one to experience this. Many, many of you have been in the same place that I am, maybe many times over. Some of you are treading this sacred ground right now.

I know this work as a pastor. However, as a daughter, I find myself in unfamiliar territory. My dad's death 18 years ago was relatively sudden, and this lingering transition between this world and the next is at the same time intensely wrenching and intensely peaceful. There is such comfort in the promise of resurrection; I especially like the way C.S. Lewis described it at the end of the last book of the Chronicles of Narnia:

*For us this is the end of all the stories... But for them it was only the beginning of the real story. All their life in this world had only been the cover and the title page: now at last they were beginning Chapter One of the Great Story which no one on earth has read, which goes on forever, and in which every chapter is better than the one before.* - C.S. Lewis, *The Last Battle*

Thank you for your love for my family and me, and especially for the ways you have loved my mom over the last

decade and a half. And thank you for this time to be with her now, as she anticipates the next chapter.

I continue to be grateful for my colleagues who cover the bases, and to all of you who grant me the holy space to walk through these days. It is all gift.

It is a joy to be the church with you.

## HEALTH TIPS

### MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health problems are more common than most people realize. Each year one in five adults will struggle with some form of a behavioral health issue, and one in twenty Americans

live with a serious mental illness, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, or major depression.

With suicide as the tenth leading cause of death in the United States, as a country we need to improve how we address the issues facing more than 57 million American's annually who suffer from some form of mental illness. With the increased stress loads and pressures of daily life that we all face, coupled with greater economic and other global challenges, the combined effects take a toll on individuals' emotional, psychological, and social well-being.

Knowledge of several warning signs can help determine if someone is living with a mental health issue that needs attention and allow for intervention to address problems before they become even greater. When an individual experiences one or more of the following feels or behaviors for prolonged periods, this may be a warning sign of a more serious condition.

### MENTAL ILLNESS WARNING SIGNS:

- Experiencing severe mood swings that cause problems in relationships.
- A change in ability to perform daily tasks like paying bills, taking care of

your family, going to work or school, loss of focus and concentration.

- Eating or sleeping too much or too little.
- Feeling unusually confused, forgetful, on edge, angry, upset, anxious, fearful, helpless, or hopeless.
- Pulling away from people and activities that you previously enjoyed.
- Having low or no energy for prolong periods that does not improve with rest.
- Feeling disconnected, numb, or that nothing matters.
- Having unexplained aches and pains.
- Using alcohol, drugs or smoking, more than usual.
- Having negative thoughts and images that you can not stop.
- Hearing voices or having feelings of paranoia.
- Thinking of harming self or others.
